Lifton Parish Council objected, Geoffrey Cox MP objected and around 450 objections were received from the public. West Devon Borough Council refused planning consent.

The statement by the Secretary of State for Communities & Local Government Greg Clark MP on 18th June 2015 said:

"...councils should only grant permission if....following consultation, the planning impacts identified by affected local communities have been <u>fully</u> addressed and therefore <u>has their backing.</u>"

Community opinion counts, your opinion counts

The Secretary of State for Energy and Climate Change Amber Rudd MP in her last statement strongly emphasised that there has to be "the support of the local community!"

Please encourage all those concerned to play their part. This is *your* last chance to stop the turbine being built.

What you can do

The appeal will be determined on the basis of written representations.

There are 3 ways to object:

All representations must be received by 21st Dec 2015.

What you can say

The June 2015 Ministerial Statement makes it clear that planning consent must not be granted without the community backing.

The developer has failed to consult the community and any concerns raised have simply been rejected.

Tell the inspector how you feel.

Your concerns might include the following reasons for refusal which were given by West Devon Borough Council:

- 1. Harm to the settings of heritage buildings
- 2. Adverse visual impact on the landscape
- 3. Adverse visual impact to recreational users
- 4. Cumulative impact
- 5. Adverse amenity impacts to nearby residents
